**ORDER**

The matter came before the Court on a motion by nonparty Maya Online Broadband Network (HK) Co. Ltd. (Maya HK) for a stay pending appeal of the Court's order dated January 11, 2002, transferring the cnnews.com domain name to plaintiff.

For good cause shown and for the reasons stated from the bench,<sup>1</sup>

It is hereby **ORDERED** that Maya HK's motion for a stay pending appeal of the Court's



<sup>1</sup> In the course of the hearing, the Court reiterated its reasons for its previous orders in this matter, including its granting summary judgment in favor of plaintiff. Maya HK argued again that *in rem* jurisdiction was inappropriate in this matter, if, as alleged, Maya HK had committed a Lanham Act tort in American commerce through use of a domain name found to be infringing of plaintiff's trademark. The flaw in this argument, as noted in the Court's previous memorandum opinions, is that it conflates the commerce requirement for establishing Lanham Act liability with the issue of *in personam* jurisdiction. The former is a requirement for an effect on American commerce, whereas the latter is a question regarding whether a defendant purposefully availed itself of the privilege of conducting activities in the forum state. Were Maya HK's argument correct, *in rem* jurisdiction would never be proper under the Anticybersquatting Consumer Protection Act (ACPA) because *in rem* cases brought under the ACPA require *both* a violation of the Lanham Act and the absence of *in personam* jurisdiction. See 15 U.S.C. § 1125(d)(2). Thus, Maya HK does not have a likelihood of success on the merits of this matter, although there is no doubt the appeal raises substantial novel legal questions.

order dated January 11, 2002, transferring the cnews.com domain name to plaintiff, is **GRANTED** and the Court's order transferring the cnews.com domain name to plaintiff<sup>2</sup> is **STAYED** pending appeal.

<sup>2</sup> The Court's order dated January 11, 2002, was not intended to order any entity beyond the jurisdictional reach of the Court to take any action. Rather, it was contemplated that Verisign, the American registry of the cnews.com domain name, could effect either the transfer or the cancellation of the infringing domain name.
